Your problem statement should sum up what your solution aims to do.






BECOMING SOLUTIONEERS: IDEATE

Design as many solutions to your problem as you can. This stage is for any and all ideas so get as many down as you can.












BECOMING SOLUTIONEERS: PROTOTYPE
